Conflict Minerals Policy Statement

AMT is committed to sourcing components and materials from companies that share our values around human rights, ethics and environmental responsibility. We require all of our suppliers to undertake reasonable due diligence with their supply chains to supply materials that are DRC conflict-free free (do not contain metals derived from “conflict minerals”; columbite-tantalite (tantalum), cassiterite (tin), gold, wolframite (tungsten), or their derivatives such that they directly or indirectly finance or benefit armed groups through mining or mineral trading in the Democratic Republic of the Congo or an adjoining country).

Although AMT is not required to report to the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC), we are committed to complying with any requirements applicable to our company and to work cooperatively with our customers and supply chain partners in implementing conflict minerals compliance programs.

Due diligence efforts

AMT has been proactively focusing its efforts on the following:

- Engaging our supply base to obtain their conflict-free status. In doing so, we mainly refer to the policy statements provided and/or confirmations from our suppliers.
- Maintaining a database of supplier conflict-free policy statements, EICC/GeSI Reporting Templates and confirmations.
- Verifying additional materials necessary in the manufacturing process (i.e. solders) meet our conflict-free requirement.
- Addressing customer inquiries on an individual basis being AMT is a contract manufacturer and produces unique products based on customer’s specifications.

AMT wishes to assure its customers of its continuing progress and commitment regarding conflict minerals.
